The artist Setareh Shahbazi will take part in the discussion with Natascha Sadr Haghighian.

We would also like to draw your attention to the following event and publication:

- On December 9 and 10, the National Gallery of Art in Washington D.C. will screen the film program "Skip Norman: Here and Now" (conceived by Jesse Cumming). This is the first presentation of Norman's films in the USA. 1. Harun Farocki Institut Presents: Tardo Agosto

Sicily, 2020. In a godforsaken landscape, a sudden change in weather finally marks the end of a suffocating summer. A group of horses stands in the shade. A city has gone up in flames. TARDO AGOSTO is a journey through Sicily from the coast to the hinterland along the trail of a raging fire that burns and destroys everything in its path. This is accompanied by the personal story of a young Gambian shepherd who has migrated to Italy and assisted the birth of his daughter in Africa from a great distance. The documentary TARDO AGOSTO dives deep into the landscapes of a scarred island.

TARDO AGOSTO was nominated best international film at the 15th edition of Beldocs and and won the CG Entertainment Distribution Award at Cinema dei Popolis.

Filippo Foscarini is a currently a guest of the residency program at the Harun Farocki Institut with support of the German-French Cultural Institute Kulturensemble (Goethe-Institut/Institut Français, Palermo).

2. Book Launch: Operational Images. From the Visual to the Invisual (University of Minnesota Press, 2023) by Jussi Parikka

Serving as an extensive guide to a key concept in contemporary art, design, and media theory, *Operational Images* explores the implications of machine vision and the limits of human agency. Taking up on Harun Farocki's initial investigation into the "operational image"—a term Farocki coined in early 2000—media theorist Jussi Parikka considers the extent to which operational images have pervaded today's visual culture, outlining how data technologies continue to develop and disrupt our understanding of images beyond representation.

Jussi Parikka is a writer and a Professor in Digital Aesthetics and Culture at Aarhus University in Denmark where he leads the Digital Aesthetics Research Centre. He is also a Visiting Professor at FAMU in Prague and at University of Southampton. In 2021 he was elected as a member of Academia Europaea. His books include *A Slow, Contemporary Violence* (2016),

Digital Contagions (2007/2016), A Geology of Media (2015) and Insect Media (2010).

3. Launch: HaFI 019: What I Do Not Recognize Yet, Now at This Very Moment by Natascha Sadr Haghighian

"We tried to get over this disturbance by learning to suppress the perception of racist structures. This in turn made it difficult to develop a commonality, a conversation about the experience of racism. Languages that were developed to articulate one's own perception, literature, songs—at most they had street credibility in Germany, if they were registered at all. As foreigners, everyone was on their own inside the epistemic bubble of integration. Any form of gathering and assembly was considered a sign of failed integration."

In her text "What I Do Not Recognize Yet, Now at This Very Moment," Natascha Sadr Haghighian grapples with the dialectics of looking in German structural racism by returning to the how's and why's of "not seeing" the NSU (the neo-Nazi organization that was able to carry out racist murders in Germany from 2000 to 2011 without being "found"). The text charts modes of strategic ignorance and recognition that operate in structural racism. Sadr Haghighian's interest in recognition goes back to a longer study on ways of seeing as political acts, in which she tried to detect or develop modes of seeing that make themselves unavailable to dominant or suggested views. "Looking Awry," not looking straightforwardly, became one of these modes of seeing that allow us to pay attention to the fringes, to the events outside of the image that in fact constitute the image. Today, Sadr Haghighian understands these modes of seeing as an embattled negotiation of recognition and ignorance, both willful and conditioned. By attending to this negotiation, life beyond a racist reality might become conceivable.
